- 2. "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me" is just not true. Words CAN hurt you. In fact, words can actually destroy those who have been slandered. Have you ever been on the wrong end of slander?

Noah Webster defined slander this way: "A false tale or report maliciously uttered, and intending to injure the reputation of another, by lessening him in the esteem of his fellow citizens, by exposing him to impeachment and punishment, or by impairing his means of living." Put that definition into your own words.
- 4. The Bible has a lot to say about slander. Read Proverbs 10:18 and 1 Peter 2:1 How can you make a practical application of these verses?
- 5. Read Ephesians 4:31-32. Discuss.
- 6. James encourages us to examine Four areas of what we believe.

7. The essence of the law is loving others.
